



## MEETING PRIORITY OUTCOMES THROUGH AN IMPACT-DRIVEN CLUB EXPERIENCE

Over the years, our primary focus has been centered in fostering regular attendance at Clubs and sustaining active participation in targeted programs. Our goal is to support Club members in overcoming challenges and realizing their aspirations. Core **Academic Success, Character & Leadership, Healthy Lifestyles** and **Life & Workforce Readiness** programming consistently evolves to address the dynamic needs of our members, extending its impact to youth and families in Des Moines. Our staff exhibit unwavering dedication, commitment, and innovation to our members and programming. They are continually exploring new avenues to enhance the wellbeing of young community members by offering a diverse range of services and activities tailored to different ages, interests, and needs. This diverse array exposes youth to fresh opportunities, facilitating the discovery of a "spark" that kindles a passion for learning.

## ACADEMIC SUCCESS GLOBALLY COMPETITIVE GRADUATES

Academic programs give all youth a space to explore, experiment, and expand on the lessons learned during the school day. Every area of Club – from the gym to the art room and science labs – is intentionally designed to ensure all members have the opportunity to develop selfdirected learning skills and foster a life-long desire to learn. By working closely in partnership with Des Moines Public Schools, our dedicated Club staff provide kids and teens with the resources they need to succeed in school and beyond.

We don't just help kids get good grades. We help them get inspired and feel empowered to build a better future for themselves. Our programs provide Club members with the knowledge and skills they need to graduate from high school on time, equipped with the technical skills, tools, and resources to pursue their interests and prepare them for college, trade school, and employment.

Each of our Clubs are equipped with resources that offer daily activities and programs designed to develop members' skills in science, technology, engineering, and math (STEM) subjects.

Our arts programs help Club members develop confidence, self-expression, and creativity, multicultural appreciation, and skills in crafts and visual, performing, and literary arts.

Each day after school, our professional staff and dedicated volunteers help Club members become more successful. They provide them with the tools and strategies to improve their academic achievement and become self-directed leaders. **STEM** develops Club member's skills and fosters interests in science, technology, engineering, and math (STEM) with hands-on projects and programming.

**Project Learn** reinforces the academic enrichment and school engagement of young people during the time they spend at Club.

**Money Matters** promotes financial responsibility and independence among teen Club members. Participants learn to manage a checking account, create a budget, save, invest, and pay for secondary education.

**Power Hour** provides strategies, activities, and resources to engage members in homework help and tutoring that encourages all Club members to become self-directed learners.



Members from Burt and Studebaker Club's STEM mentoring program had the chance to go behind the scenes at Omaha's Henry Doorly Zoo and Aquarium! This visit was part of their World of Water unit from this past summer, where we explored aquifers, water sources, pollution, and our dependence on water.

The trip was a fantastic way to enhance our curriculum with handson learning. We toured massive water treatment tanks, watched keepers feed wildlife, and even observed them recording data and providing enrichment training! Everyone enjoyed the traditional aquarium experience, and many Club members shared that their favorite moment was touching a starfish!

## BOYS & GIRLS CLUBS OF CENTRAL IOWA IMPLEMENTS ACTIVE LEARNING METHODOLOGIES IN ALL OF OUR STEM PROGRAMS.

Active Learning (also called experiential learning, hands on learning, informal learning and constructivist learning) is a teaching method where students are actively engaged in the learning process by participating in activities that require them to think critically, discuss, investigate, and apply knowledge, rather than passively receiving information through lectures and memorization. Active learning results in more effective learning, retention, and equity across diverse populations. Aside from higher academic performance and bridging the academic gap, active learning has also proven to improve student motivation and self-efficacy and self-confidence by enabling self-management and developing learner 21st-century skills.

Here are a few of the active learning experiences that our members have experienced this past year.

**Outdoor exploration:** Members in elementary and secondary programs were all given the opportunity to explore the outdoors through geocaching in city and county parks. Through this experience they discovered how satellites help us follow map directions while they are exploring wildlife and nature in forest spaces, prairie and grass areas.

**Angle, trajectory, force and light:** Elementary members got to participate in Glow Golf (mini golf) in our clubs. With 4 putting greens, members had to sink their fluorescent ball into the cup to win their prize.

**Robotics:** Members experienced coding and remote control using Sphero robot jousting and racing and with our friends from Johnston High Schools 1st LEGO League Robotics team.

**Ball Maze:** Members created mazes to get a small ball through. They put a lot of thought into the components of their maze which focused on angle, friction and force.



## CHARACTER & LEADERSHIP 21ST CENTURY LEADERS

We aim to foster the next generation of leaders, fully prepared to live and lead in a diverse and integrated world. Club members develop a strong peer network, a deeper connection to their community, and an understanding of personal responsibility, social justice, and service through our leadership programs. We empower young people to support and influence their community, sustain meaningful relationships, develop a positive self-image, participate in the democratic process, and respect their own and others' cultural identities.

Boys & Girls Club members develop strong character and leadership skills through engaging programs like Adulting, Launch Your Future (LYF), and Torch Club. These initiatives provide hands-on opportunities to build essential life skills, foster responsibility, and inspire teamwork. In programs like Adulting, members gain practical knowledge on managing real-world tasks such as budgeting, goal setting, and effective communication. LYF focuses on strengthening soft skills and empowering young leaders to navigate challenges with confidence and resilience. Torch Club encourages middle schoolers to lead by example, guiding them to organize community service projects, build peer mentorships, and cultivate a sense of civic responsibility. Together, these programs help shape members into confident, capable leaders ready to make a positive impact on their communities."


**Torch Clubs** are chartered, small-group leadership and service clubs for boys and girls 11 to 13 years old. A Torch Club is a powerful vehicle that helps Club staff meet the special character development needs of younger adolescents at a critical stage in their lives.

Junior Staff is a small-group program that is both practical and user friendly. It assists Club members ages 13 to 18 in exploring a career in youth or human services, particularly Boys & Girls Club work.

**Mentorship** Our youth have opportunities to connect with community professionals for guidance and advice in a variety of fields to support their development.

**SMART Girls** provides health, prevention education, and self-esteem enhancement for girls 8 to 17 years old.

**Passport to Manhood** teaches responsibility to boys ages 11 to 14 with sessions that focus on a specific aspect of character and manhood through highly interactive activities.

## HEALTH AND WELL-BEING HEALTHIER GENERATIONS

Increasing kids' and teens' healthy habits will strengthen their ability to interact positively with others and form healthy relationships. Developing good habits early leads to better health and quality of life throughout adulthood.

Healthy lifestyles programs teach kids the value of exercise, proper nutrition, fitness, teamwork, sportsmanship, and social & emotional learning.

Programming that teaches and supports the importance of setting goals, motivation, making decisions, and communication with others helps youth to become responsible citizens of their communities. Whether these skills come from team sports, competitions, or Social Emotional Specific programming, youth are learning the skills they need to build healthy relationships, succeed in schools and workplaces, and contribute to the communities they live in. Social Emotional Health and Well-Being programming has been shown to improve academic performance and create safer environments. At Boys & Girls Clubs, youth get excited to play games and sports, compete in local and national competitions, and work with community partners to learn about healthy relationships."

### **INSPIRING HEALTHY LIFESTYLES**

#### Daily Meals & Snacks

Thanks to key community partners, we provide healthy snacks, balanced meals, and supplementary food items for our kids and families.

#### **Triple Play Sports**

Through the Triple Play experience, local Boys & Girls Clubs challenge members to become healthy and active by learning new ways to manage stress, improve their physical fitness through regular physical activity and competitive sports leagues, building both their positive social skills and character.

#### **Cooking Class**


Club members have the opportunity to engage in hands-on, comprehensive activities that teach them how to cook and learn lifelong skills that impact their health in positive ways. Members practice making healthy snacks and meal options together and taste the results.

## Did you know?

All BGCCI Club members and their families have access to a Licensed Master Social Worker (LMSW) for ongoing crisis support and resource referrals.



Several BGCCI staff members completed a Youth Mental Health First Aid course hosted by United Way of Central Iowa. Participants learned how to identify, understand, and respond to mental health and substance use challenges in youth. The course equipped staff with the skills needed to reach out and provide initial help and support to youth who may be struggling with mental health challenges or experiencing a crisis.





100% of all Club members participate in Triple Play activities and 80% of alumni nationwide said Club had a positive impact on their attitude towards fitness and health.

In Iowa, 14% of children have experienced at least one major depressive episode, and 59% of those children did not receive any mental health services.





## LIFE AND WORKFORCE READINESS

Boys & Girls Clubs of Central Iowa believes when every young person has access to quality out-of-school opportunities that intentionally support their workforce readiness, they are well-positioned for Great Futures. Our evidence-informed approach to workforce readiness puts holistic skill development and career exposure at the forefront of each Club member's experience. The goal is to provide all youth, from age six through their teen years, with

the knowledge, skills, and learning experiences they need to succeed in life and work.

By focusing on workforce readiness, we are helping to develop today's youth into tomorrow's scientists, doctors, nurses, civic leaders, teachers, engineers, programmers, entrepreneurs, and the inventors of jobs and workplaces that we can't yet imagine.



### **EMPOWERING YOUNG PEOPLE TO SUCCEED**

To help young people meet the workforce challenges of tomorrow, they need safe spaces, positive mentorship and work experiences today. We provide opportunities for youth and teens to:

- · Explore their interests and passions
- Develop their employability skills
- Apply their knowledge to real-world work experiences

These goals are achieved through essential skill development, career exposure, employability skills and certifications and work-based learning. Club members have new opportunities to explore careers, visit employers, earn certifications and make a plan for what comes next.

 More than 50 unique program and employer partners provided their time and talent to introducing members in 6th-12th grade to various career paths, industries, and skill-building. This includes more than 30 field trips to college or postsecondary campuses and employers throughout central lowa.

- Through the Career Pathways program, we were able to help our teens earn 46 industry-recognized credentials including OSHA 10, CPR/First Aid, and Iowa driver's permit.
- 22 teens were provided the opportunity to secure their driver's permits through our participation in the lowa DOT's Skip the Trip program.

# LAUNCH YOUR FUTURE

During the summer, 13 high school Club members participated in our Launch Your Future program, a sevenweek paid internship program. Participants explored in-demand careers, gained hands-on experience, began building connections with employers, and earned certifications aimed at boosting employability prospects.

### **DES MOINES ELECTRICAL APPRENTICESHIP**

The interns toured the training facility, learned about electricity and the opportunities that an electrical apprenticeship can offer, and even participated in some fun, hands-on activities. Interns and staff alike linked up to become a human electrical chain and worked as pairs to race against the clock (and each other) to wire an electrical circuit.

### **IRONWORKERS LOCAL 67.**

Interns toured the training center and got to experience a little of what an ironworker does on the job. A few brave ones tried their hand at welding, while others hopped over to the practice frame and started bolting together beams.

### **HVAC TRAINING INSTITUTE**

Iowa Pipe Trades & HVAC Training Institute and Plumbers & Steamfitters Local 33 hosted a group of interns from our Launch Your Future program. Our teens (and staff) had a great time gearing up in PPE for some welding, soldering, and brazing practice.



# **CAREER EXPLORATION**

This year, our members had the opportunity to explore a variety of technologies, connecting them to real-world careers and honing their problem-solving skills. The spring season started off strong with the Photography Club. Members particularly enjoyed a visit to the Botanical Center, where they captured stunning photos of the vibrant foliage.

The summer was packed with engaging activities and field trips. Members had hands-on experiences with the Glowforge and Cricut, including creating customized glass tumblers by designing stencils. A highlight of the season was a visit to MidAmerican Energy's training center, where members participated in a virtual welding activity that left a lasting impression and sparked ongoing conversations. Additionally, we visited the Science Center of Iowa, where members participated in innovation lab workshops, learning about TinkerCAD, fiber art, and toy deconstruction. These activities not only provided valuable experiences outside the classroom but also prepared members for success in the club.

In August, a group of members were invited to Grand View University to check out the Esports arena, where members were able to play with each other and ask college esports coaches their burning questions. This past fall, 3D printing and 3D pens became member favorites, with many participants designing and creating their own projects. It has been an exciting year of exploration, creativity, and skillbuilding for our members, as they continue to grow and connect with new opportunities.



# **BGCCI, DMPS EXPAND OPTIONS ACADEMY TO DRAKE CAMPUS**

## BOYS & GIRLS CLUBS OF CENTRAL IOWA LAUNCHES OPTIONS ACADEMY AT GREGORY & SUZIE GLAZER BURT CLUB IN PARTNERSHIP WITH DES MOINES PUBLIC SCHOOLS

Boys & Girls Clubs of Central Iowa (BGCCI) is excited to announce the expansion of Options Academy, a transformative educational program designed for youth aged 17-21, in collaboration with Des Moines Public Schools (DMPS). The program, which supports students in earning their high school diplomas while preparing them for future workforce opportunities, will provide an additional location at the Gregory & Suzie Glazer Burt Club on Drake University's campus. DMPS provides dedicated teachers to guide students through a personalized curriculum that allows for self-paced learning and HiSET exam preparation. This unique approach offers a fresh path for students who may feel that traditional schooling is not meeting their needs.

Options Academy is set to serve approximately 60 youth during the 2024-2025 school year.

## **PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS**

- Personalized Learning Plans: Each student will receive a customized educational plan tailored to their unique needs and aspirations.
- **Career Coaching:** Options Academy offers career coaching and pathways to post-secondary opportunities, helping students to envision their future beyond graduation.
- Free Resources: Participants will receive a free DART Pass for transportation, as well as complimentary breakfast and lunch.
- Academic Support: Instruction includes traditional credit recovery methods and competency-based assessments to address core credit gaps.
- Integration with Home School: Students remain enrolled at their home school, allowing them access to Advanced Placement courses, Central Campus offerings, ROTC, and extracurricular activities.

"Education cannot succeed when it is a one-size-fitsall model. At DMPS, Options Academy has grown and succeeded by providing students with the support and flexibility they need and deserve in order to complete their high school education and prepare for their future," says Dr. Ian Roberts, superintendent of Des Moines Public Schools. "Boys & Girls Clubs of Central Iowa has been a wonderful partner of DMPS for many years. Allowing us to expand access to the opportunities offered by Options Academy at their Gregory & Suzie Glazer Burt Club on the Drake campus serves our joint missions of helping young people succeed." In addition to the Options Academy, students are

encouraged to become members of Boys & Girls Clubs of Central Iowa.




